For many years the local people have named them “Giant’s Graves”. There is also a well-known story of one great Giant from Ireland, Finn MacCool and his shrewd wife.

An Irish giant, Finn MacCool and Benandonner, a giant from Scotland, lived on opposite sides of the sea. One day, they decided to have a competition to see who was stronger. Finn started to build a long stone road across the sea for Benandonner to walk on. It took him many days to finish the road and when it was ready, Finn was so exhausted that he went to bed. The next morning, Finn’s wife, Oonagh noticed Benandonner coming. It wasn’t a good day because Finn was too tired to fight after building the road. Oonagh quickly dressed Finn like a baby, put him into the pram and told him not to talk, but just cry. When Benandonner arrived, she told him that Finn went to the wood and she is looking after their baby. Benandonner saw a giant baby and he said “If that’s the baby, I don’t want to meet the father!”. So he ran back to Scotland , breaking the road.
